After receiving assistance from Arts Queensland they will be doing four events this year, kicking off with Latinoosa '08.

This exciting event will comprise of dancing, workshops, lessons and a host of other great activities at The J this Saturday, with the highlight of the event being the introduction of sought-after Brisbane salsa band N'ritmoz.

"They actually have personalities of the salsa scene like Marina Varney who used to be the front singer for one of the longest established salsa bands in Queensland," Jalberto from Timbeao Planet said.

"She is now together with her partner Pablo Matus to form N'ritmoz.

"Pablo comes from Chile and he is very well-known in the salsa scene and for teaching percussion."

The event will start with a dance and percussion workshop at 6.30pm with workshop facilitators offering dance instruction with the incorporation of live percussion tuition for those who want to further their knowledge and accuracy in their dance.

"Dancers will be able to understand and relate to rhythm," Jalberto said.

"(For example) the rhythm produced by the conga drums, which is a prevalent sound in Latin music.

"So they are being taught certain strokes on the drum to go with certain steps in the dance.

"That's going to be a new thing which will help a lot, even for experienced dancers, to experience a different dimension to the dance."

After the percussion and dance workshop everyone will burn up the floor to the tunes of popular DJ Pato.

"He has been taking the scene by storm in Melbourne," Jalberto said.

"He specialises in Latin music as well as popular music."

And to top it all off there will be an exciting floor show by Smooth Latin Groove.

"The Smooth Latin Groove studio is one of the favourite Latin dance schools in Brisbane," Jalberto said.

So make sure you get along to this veritable smorgasbord of Latin fun on Saturday night at The J.
